

Registration

- Every year
- What you need:
 - Form, signed by teacher
 - \$50 year / \$35 half year
 - Photos
 - Stamped envelope
 - Birth certificate (once only)
- If you change levels during the year, you don't need to pay again.
- Your registration includes insurance
- Bring your rego card to EVERY competition



Registration cards





- Primary
 - Designed to introduce our youngest dancers
 - Stay until 7th Birthday
 - Can progress to nextlevel earlier than 7 years





- Beginners
 - Held until the dancer...
 - a)Gains a 1st, 2nd or 3rd in the Fling, Swords, Seann Triubhas or Reel in SIX separate competitions OR
 - b)Until 12 months following first Beginner stamp, whichever is the later.





If you enter and dance in a more advanced category, you are unable to return to the previous category (even though you might not have received a prize)



- Novice
 - Held until the dancer...
 - a)Gains a 1st, 2nd or 3rd in any dance in SIX separate competitions OR
 - b)Until 12 months following first Novice stamp, whichever is the later.





- Intermediate
 - Held until the dancer...
 - a)Gains a 1st, 2nd or 3rd in any dance in SIX separate competitions OR
 - b) Until 12 months following first Intermediate stamp, whichever is the later.





- Premier
 - Most advanced category
 - No squares
 - Premier
 (with Restriction):
 be sure to read the rules that relate to the restriction.

Examinations

- Can be an exciting and rewarding experience!
- Dancers learn to participate in an exam situation which can prepare them for other similar life experiences.
- Exams allow the opportunity for dancers to have their technique independently critiqued.
- The ultimate goal is to progress through the levels and attain a professional Teachers, Examiners or even Adjudicators qualification.
- There are a variety of organisations who conduct examinations, your teacher will be affiliated with one of them.



Competitive Highland Dance

Why compete?

Experts say that healthy competition can help kids learn things they'll use for the rest of their lives. Skills such as:

- How to be a good loser
- How to be a good winner
- How to give your best (training and competition)
- How to work for a long-term goal
- How almost everything you do in life improves with practice.

"Hard work beats talent when talent doesn't work hard"



How competitions work ...and some helpful tips!

Entering a competition

- Your teacher will talk with you about when your child is ready to begin competing.
- There may be a process for entering competitions in your studio – best to check with your teacher.
- Competition schedules are usually available online, or via email from your teacher.
- For local comps, you can find them here: http://www.sqrchdi.com/competitions.php
- Read the schedule carefully, and make sure you enter into the correct category.



How competitions work ...and some helpful tips!

On the day of the competition

- Arrive in plenty of time, as sometimes the competition is running early (though they won't start early unless everyone has arrived).
- Register your dancer at the official table with their registration card and get their competition number.
- Check the program to see which section they are in.
- Get dressed and listen for the section to be called.
- When called, line up at the marshalling area and the marshal will check everyone in.
- Dance your best and don't forget to smile!!!



How competitions work ...and some helpful tips!

- After everyone in the section has danced, the judge will make their decision. The marks will be scrutineered and prizes will be awarded.
- If you are in Beginners, Novice or Intermediate, your rego card will be marked if you place in the relevant dances. You might get this back right away, or you might get it back at the end of the day. Always make sure you have it before you leave.
- *TOP TIP* Parents take your own food OR be prepared with plenty of cash...you will need it for the canteen!



Judging

Did you know?

- Judges are not allowed to judge their own relatives, students, or students of relatives.
- Dancers must wait 3 months before they can dance in front of a judge who has taught them.

How do judges arrive at their decision?

- Dancers are given a mark out of 100.
- Marks are awarded for Timing, Technique and General Deportment.
- The dancer with the highest mark is the winner.
- The judges decision is final.
- Judges marks are never given out.



Titles and Aggregates

- A combining of results of two or more dances for an overall award.
- Points are awarded as follows:

1st: 137 points

2nd: 91 points

3rd: 71 points

4th: 53 points

5th: 37 points

6th: 23 points

Championships & National Premierships

- The pinnacle of competitive highland dancing
- Premier only
- Championship 4 dances Highland Fling, Sword Dance, Seann Triubhas, Reel
- National Premiership 4 national dances – change each year
- "Set" steps everyone does the same steps
- Three judges for each dance

Awards & Presentations



- If your dancer is awarded a prize to be presented on stage, they must be wearing their kilt or national costume.
- For Championships, they must be wearing their kilt.

- Meet highland dancers from other places, you'll have friends for life.
